The promotion of these meetings is necessary because the entire story is <u>not</u> expected to be given by GVRD. Recycling can be done with up to 100% re-use of materials; stuff like paper, glass, metal, cans, plastics and styrofoam and organic refuse. Separating such substances at source on an individual basis, the need to do it, how it will be collected, how recycled, etc., will be the main thrust of the GVRD meetings.

On Sunday, 19 March, Hilda Beckwith (Lower Mainland Waste Management Coalition) and Lenore (Citizen's Action Network) gave a well-attended Town Hall meeting much of the information that the government emphatically does not give.

To begin, garbage is Big Business. What information they do give takes the form of porpaganda, the tip of the iceberg: 'We're doing our part'; 'more incinerators are needed'; 'Resource Recovery Plants are the best example of our efforts'; 'what's left over is totally unusable'; 'the emissions from incinerators are safe' and 'burning toxic waste isn't hazardous to public health'...and so on.

Hilda spoke at length on the findings of independent research; the facts that the promotion of the GVRD & Socred & NPA scheme tries to hide, gloss over or lie about:



If the Carnegie book-keepers want to break even & wipe out the \$28,000 deficit City Hall charges them with, they will have to stop handing out coffee tickets for Volunteer work.

If a "Volunteer" gets paid, even one dollar, even one 35¢ ticket, technically, he/she is an underpaid employee, not a Volunteer, because capitalism, measuring all values in terms of money, will never give a sucker an even break.

In its definition of the word
"Volunteer", the Concise Oxford
Dictionary says, "A person who spontaneously undertakes a task. To offer one's services"...it doesn't mention money at all. In fact, it relates "Volunteer" to "voluntary military service" - which is paid wages directly out of government funds & is not considered a "deficit"

If you volunteer to kill people for the government you will be paid well for your voluntary efforts, no questions asked.

All these 35¢ tickets add up, the work gets done - but the government charges us with a "deficit"... If we would volunteer to go to foreign lands & kill people for the government - that would be honourable paid work, valued by capitalism, not a deficit... But since we're just doing our every day life support work that seems necessary at the time, we (Volunteers) are a liability - & our work has been defined by our elected representatives as a neverending debt. This cruel & unusual attitude - where does it come from? Social Planning?...from the desk of the rich & successful Max Beck?... or does it just trickle down from bank managers & bookkeepers everywhere, who's purpose may be, as a psychological bottom line, to keep economic pressure on everyone & encourage feelings of inadequacy

wherever they can.

...more emotional, economic slavery for us all, represented, apparently innocently enough, by a simple reduction in coffee tickets.

VOLUNTEER TICKETS (II)

What you've just read gives a distorted picture so here's the facts:

- 1. The deficit in the kitchen comes from trading food&coffee for pieces of paper volunteer tickets. Carnegie will continue giving these out to the people who give their time and energy. Last year the cost to the kitchen was \$28,000. City Hall gets statements that it cost \$28,000 to fund the Volunteer Program, but the kitchen then has to make \$28,000 surplus to break even.
- 2. Tickets are not being cut back.

The system for getting tickets is being applied to all volunteers; some positions are affected, not by a reduction, but by the volunteers having to get tickets the same way as all the rest of us.

- 3. Volunteers, as said above, are by "definition" unpaid, but here a volunteer does work in exchange for a lot more than 8 tickets. If you feel you're an "underpaid employee" then you aren't a volunteer at all.
- 4. The Association doesn't have anything to do with funding tickets.
 The kitchen has to bear the full cost all the time.
- 5. No conspiracy is afoot. If any business gives away all of its surplus it can't pay the bills. It can either stop giving away the profit or reduce unnecessary or wasteful expense so the giving doesn't have to stop. This is what the kitchen is doing. No volunteer is being cut off or cut back.

Disposable cups, plates, cutlery are all a normal part of our day. Mostly we don't even think about them, but lately a lot of concern has been raised about this type of material. It is called POLYSTYRENE and is made from petroleum by-products. It is light, cheap and can be adapted to make a dizzying variety of products that protect, hold water, insulate, float and fly. One very common use is to hold hot coffee.

Its popularity and usefulness has increased over the past few years to the point where in 1988, North American industry churned out 2.4 million metric tons of it. Almost half of this went to produce coffee cups, foam trays for supermarkets, hinged foam containers for fast food and other kinds of disposable products. Roughly 3,000 tons of polystyrene ends up in North American garbage cans every day — enough to make 900 million take out coffee cups which, loosely packed, would fill 100 75—

One of the main problems with polystyrene foam is that there is no real way to dispose of it. In landfills plastic remains intact, inert, and will not biodegrade. Obviously we cannot continue to fill up garbage dumps with stuff that will never

break down.

Recycling of this material has been slow to happen, and is only being considered because of the pressure of public opinion. If big corporations like McDonald's weren't afraid of public boycotts they wouldn't even look at this option. Only two polystyrene recycling centres are being

considered in Norht America. One of these is in a suburb of Boston and one is on Long Island, N.Y.

Plastics of all kinds are a big problem. In Seattle they must send their plastics all the way to Thailand to be recycled. The biggest problem with recycling any plastic has always been collecting and transporting the lightwieght materials as well as sorting out the different warieties - these cannot be recycled if they get mixed ogether.

Apart from the fact that this material will not break down and will be qith us for ever and ever, the process used to make these containers is damaging to the environment. CHLORO-FLOURO CARBONS are used to blow bubbles into the polystyrene foam to make the material light weight. This is the same material that is used in a number of different ways (refridgerators, etc.) that the world is trying to ban because it is destroying the ozone.

Once again we have to look at our daily habits. How many cups of coffee in one day do we drink with disposable cups? How many cups a day do we put in the garbage? How much of this garbage do we, at Carnegie, put out each day? These questions have been on the minds of the kitchen staff at Carnegie for a long time.

The good news is that real dishes that can be washed and re-used are on order for the kitchen. Just imagine drinking a cup of hot coffee out of a real coffee mug! When they arrive they will require a different mind frame on the part of the users. They will need to be carefully collected and returned to the kitchen. We, as a community, will need to take responsibility for looking after our 'real dishes'. Just think of it as protecting the space on our planet.

This week, in Tofino, rich American tourists are getting their annual cheap thrill off the migration of grey whales. Debbie Payton, an American scientist on the scene, described the oil slick as resembling "chocolate mousse" - making it sound almost good enough to eat. In the last few days many birds, sea lions, sea otters & killer whales have been sighted swimming in the oil, but they won't last long. Local people say the oil fumes are overwhelming... Doris Lopez, a resident of Valdez, said, "Men are coming to town dizzy & sick to their stomachs when they've only been out there an hour."

In spite of this tragedy, Exxon's terrorism (business) on the high seas will continue. American citizens continue to demand that billions of barrels of crude oil be shipped to them every day - most of it by supertanker.

Governments & businesses have been working together to ensure that nothing slows down the delivery of supertanker oil. By saying they will pay people to clean it up, & putting as much blaim as possible on individual employees, the giant, faceless, mindless Exxon Corporation avoids the responsibility & remains intact behind the scenes. planning further industrial terrorism against the natural world.



4. The incinerator is a private business. Tax dollars (to us in higher rents) pay \$65/ton to have mixed garbage taken there, of which the company gets \$27 a ton in profit.

5. For every 4 tons of waste burned there is 1 ton of ash. This ash is highly toxic and is dumped into landfills, put in barrels and buried, etc. Leakage of this poison into ground water is common and the food

chain is drastically affected.


6. Toxic waste cannot be safely disposed of using current methods.

7. Solid and toxic wastes are processed to produce "fuel pellets", still concentrated poison, and then they are sold to other communities at a healthy profit. The polluting effect is increased proportionately.



8. Known poisons in toxic waste include PCBs and dioxins. Much information was released recently about the effects of PCBs. Dioxins are a deadly part of pulp & apaer waste: dumped daily in offshore waters and totalling 90,000 tons a year. Dioxins are carcinogenic (cancer-causing) in people and animals. They also cause organ disfunction, skin disorders, damage to immune systems and birth defects. These substances are already part of the food chain, being ingested with plants contaminated with them. As one report states: "One litre of milk taken from a cow eating contaminated fodder will have the same amount of dioxins as you would get from breathing the air near an in-

cinerator for eight months."

Lenore has been working with the Bonaparte Band near Cache Creek. The GVRD plans to use the site there to dump waste from Resource Recovery (or Resource Rip-off) Plants in Vancouver. "Rip-off" is precisely correct. pay up to \$95 a ton to have waste taken to such a plant, where it's dumped on the floor and there is separation. of the materials that are recyclible. The privately-owned operation promises to recover only 20% (tops) of the tonnage brought in. The rest, meaning the mixed up trash that no one separates at the source, will be trucked to landfill sites and dumped. The recovered materials are the property of the company and are sold at a clear profit. The rip-off is that most if not all of the garbage made by society can be recycled if separation occurs at source.

The City of Vancouver Council is proposing that only residential garbage need be separated at source, while the major producers of trash - corporations, hotels, apartment buildings, businesses - can continue to throw everything in one "can" to be hauled away as usual. We'll just pay

for it by way of frustration at having to suffer through another round of practiced stupidity. Lenore continued her caustic expose, citing common knowledge about the toxicity of industrial waste and the fact that commercial garbage, when put through the process of compression or burning, produces dozens of deadly chemiclls. all along the line.

Cache Creek residents, especially the Native Peoples who fish in the rivers, report catching slamon that actually glow in the dark, as a result of ingesting toxic waste that leechs into ground water from landfill.

Deadly radioactive leaks are widespread

Part of the growing nightmare is the involvement of Gemstar and Wastech. Wastech is responsible for convincing NPA aldermen that Seattle's Resource Recovery (again, Resource Rip-off) Plant deserves a twin in Vancouver, near Main & Terminal. They work along the same PR lines as Gemstar, the company that wants to create landfill and toxic waste dumps in the interior of B.C.. Gemstar is a subsidiary of the Becktel Group, a California consortium heavily into thecreation of toxic waste (via nuclear power plants (and the materials for nuclear weapons)) in the USA and Third World sites. They claim expertise in disposing of such waste, but the record shows this to be an obscene statement. Most if not all nuclear and toxic waste is hidden or dumped or put in containers that cannot retain this junk for the few hundred thousand years necessary until it's "safe". What they do is find out-of-the-way sites and "outof-sight/out-of-mind" is their operating ideology.

The "out-of-the-way" sites...
Indian reservations and tribal land.

Even if we never use the bomb again, with the continued production of nuclear weapons we are poisoning ourselves with radioactivity leaking into the earth, the water, and the air.

The Hanford Nuclear Reservation in southeast Washington State is one of the largest and oldest nuclear facilities. Hanford produced the plutonium for Trinity, the world's first nuclear bomb, and for thousands of nuclear weapons since.

- Much of Hanlord's 570 square miles has become thoroughly contaminated by radioactive and chemical waste. By 1982, 12 million cubic meters of the nuclear reservation's soil had become so contaminated with plutonium that the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE) own guidelines required that the soil be transferred to an underground waste facility. Rather than dispose of the contaminated soil, the DOE raised by ten times its own guidelines for allowable plutonium concentrations in the soil. With the stroke of a pen, plutonium-contaminated waste became low-level waste, and plutonium continues to accumulate in Hanlord's soil.
- In 1984, a Washington State official estimated the amount of plutonium in Hanford's defense waste to be approximately 3,030 pounds. If a mere teaspoon of plutonium, about three ounces, were spread among the entire population of the earth, it would exceed the DOE's "permissible" lifetime body-burden limits for all five billion of us.
- Radioactively and chemically contaminated ground water is seeping from the Hanlord Reservation into the Columbia River. Although Hanlord is 300 miles inland, by 1978 radioactivity from its plutonium reactors had been detected on the Pacific continental shell from southern Canada to northern California.
- Over the past four decades Hanlord has released into the atmosphere over 1 million curies of thyroid-seeking iodine-131, a known carcinogen. Until this year, these releases were never announced to the American public. On December 2, 1949, Hanlord officials intentionally released 5 thousand curies of iodine-131 in a "planned experiment," details of which are still being withheld. By comparison, the Three Mile Island accident released an estimated 15 curies.

■ An independent panel has studied Hanlord's 23year-old N-Reactor and concludes that "the similarities between Chemobyl and Hanlord are substantial and make a Chemobyl-type accident at Hanlord a distinct possibility, while the differences tend in general to make the N-Reactor more, rather than less, dangerous than its Soviet counterpart."

The silent, gradual radioactive contamination of the earth already threatens us with disease and potential genetic destruction—dangers that may, in the end, be as harmful as nuclear war itself.

These and many other facts about the Hanford Nuclear Reservation are being brought out and publicized by the Hanford Education Action League (HEAL), a group of research scientists, investigative reporters, and concerned citizens in Washington State.

HEAL is supported by the Peace Development Fund and the Pacific Peace Fund, public foundations that raise money and grant it to hundreds of citizen groups throughout the U.S. working for a safe and peaceful world. We urge you to become fully informed about all the risks of producing, deploying, and potentially using nuclear weapons, and we invite you to support the Funds' effort to bring the nuclear arms race to a halt.

Often the presence of such poisons is secret knowledge of the companies responsible for producing them. ...Love Canal?...the Expo lands...?!

Part of Gemstar's options include covering the deadly junk with a plastic liner and then just dumping soil on top. Nothing is done to remove it or stop it from leeching into ground water or exploding as forming gases combine.

The GVRD meetings promise to address little except asking us to be sure and wash bottles and cans. When the Resource Rip-off scheme was before Vancouver City Council no less than 22 delegations spoke against it, many raising the above concerns. The NPA majority carried the day with practiced stupidity: the people spoke uniformingly against the whole plan, the engineers working for the companies ready to go ahead spoke for it and majority passing for aldermen got up and said: "The people have spoken, we've heard them, and we vote Yes!"

The future of life on our planet can either be beautiful or non-existent. Our personal support is essential to demand a referendum on the creation of any system that excludes the participation of the biggest garbage makers in waste disposal. The NPA majority on the Parks Board refused to establish a moratorium on the use of any part of the Expo lands for park space until the effects of the poisons buried there are known.

They, like their party-members on City Council, seem to have too many family and friend connections to the profits to be derived to act in the public's interest. Political honesty ...well, uh... you know...

Dropped atom bomb

on Nagasaki

Kermit Beahan, 70, who dropped the atomic bomb on Nagasaki and said he wanted the distinction of being the last man ever to use the device on humans, died on Thursday after suffering cardiac arrest following prostate surgery.

Mr. Beahan was the bombardier on the plane that dropped an atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Nagasaki on Aug. 9, 1945, killing an estimated 70,000 people.

"I saw a mushroom cloud bubbling and flashing orange, red and green," he recalled later in an interview with the Houston Chronicle. "It looked like a picture of hell. The ground itself was covered by a rolling black smoke. I was told the area would be destroyed, but I

didn't know the meaning of an

atomic bomb."

In 1985, on the fortieth anniversary of the city's destruction, he said he would never apologize for the bombing. He said 25 Japanese had sought him out a few years ago and told him the bombing was the "best way out of a hell of a mess."

But he said he hoped to be the last man ever to drop such a bomb on people.

Mr. Beahan also flew in 40 bombing missions in Europe.


Concerts on Vancouver's waterfront docks, performances on construction sites, visual art shows in union halls and poetry readings during workers' lunch-hour are also planned.

Beneath you are two floors of parking and two floors of luxury retail stores, then an open-air mall. But, you're still sipping a tall. cool one at Broadway & Commercial Drive a couple of hundred feet

above the Grandview cut rail-line.

What are the Burlington Northern rail boys moving along the old line today? Mostly 60 foot long railcars of gasoline. Also they boogie along with propane and anhydrous ammonia toxic gas, chlorine, and even artillery shells.

Now Intercon Co. wants to buy the air-rights above hazardous cargo tracks and put up buildings. than the luxury retail stores there would be an 18-storey high-rent apartment and an 8-storey office

tower - all above these tracks.

The tunnel there is 225 feet long and over 300 innocent people would be in it in vehicles at any given If there were an explosion in the tunnel the walls would produce

intense shock waves, crushing & flinging cars. Fire , heat & toxic chemicals would make any rescue impossible, according to Vancouver's Fire Chief. (A deluge water system would turn the floor of the tunnel into a towering inferno of water & chems.) Here's what city managers said about exploding railcars: 1) there's an immediate "fire-ball" for 1,000

feet(3 blocks); 2) there's

"heavy impact" for 1 mile;

and 3) windows are blown .

The safety checking of railcars for leaks has decreased to about once a month when what's needed is every car, every day. It's an explosive situation.


out for 3 miles.

At peak hours (6am & 6pm) there are 15,000 people within the "heavy impact" area around Broadway & Commercial and contrary to reports, the safety of rail cargo is decreasing. The amounts of toxic, deadly cargoes are increasing in Vancouver each year.

It's completely unnecessary for the NPA section of council to put thousands of innocent people's lives at stake in the "high risk area" that this is. City engineers have proposed a 4-lane freeway alongside the tracks; tracks on which hundreds of kinds of chemicals will be moved.

Council (again the NPA section) has intimidated the Fire Chief. There will be a public hearing at the Trout Lake Centre on April 20th.

Molson's took over Carling-O'Keefe, Canadian Airlines took over Wardair, and Imperial Oil put up \$4.9 billion to buy Texaco Canada. It was just another week for business in the new environment created by Canada's decision to ratify the Free Trade Agreement. Days later. Stone Container of Chicago put up \$2.6 billion to take pulp and paper producer Consolidated Bathurst out of Canadian control. And market analysts say Canadian companies are undervalued and may increasingly become targets for U.S. takeovers, particularly in the resource sector.

The new Molson's -- 50 per cent owned by the Elder's brewing empire from Australia -- lost no time in announcing plans to shut down breweries in Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver, Lethbridge, Saskatoon, Winnipeg and St. John's. 1400 jobs will be eliminated.

The beer merger is in theory not linked to the FTA, because brewing was exempt from the deal. But Molson's has set a target to double its sales into the U.S. market - a clear signal for U.S. brewers to seek increased access to Canada.

The CAIL takeover of Wardair is part of the concentration of Canadian airlines that has followed deregulation of Canadian air transport beginning in the early 1980's. It leaves Air Canada and Canadian with over 90% of the Canadian market.

The model for the Wardair takeover is deregulation in the U.S., which has seen low-price carriers like People's Express forced to the wall and the industry merged down to half a dozen large carriers.

Labour had warned prior to the election that plant shutdowns would follow adoption of the FTA, and that's exactly what happened once the Conservatives were returned. Close to 5,000 jobs have been slated for elimination in shutdowns directly or partly related to the FTA in the past two months. They include:

- * 975 jobs at Northern Telecom plants in Aylmer, P.Q., Belleville, Ont., and Bramalea, Ont;
- 600 jobs as Gillette transfers razor and pen production from Montreal and Toronto to the U.S.;
 - 1400 jobs targeted at Molson Breweries;
- * 335 jobs in Canadian Tire's auto parts operation in Toronto;
- 100 jobs at Echlin Canada Ltd. as the company shifts auto parts production to the U.S.






