televised, a camera crew was in Carnegie to see what people here had to say about it. The TV in the Seniors Lounge was tuned to a movie and no one made any move to switch it: the reporter wanted to film the editor of the Newsletter handing out the paper but that would've been an obvious sham and it didn't happen; no one reacted with the frightened look or righteous indignation expected... It's so hard for people who get paid every week or two, who have cars and TVs and groceries and pick and choose for entertainment and so on. for the middle class, who are at least comfortable, to realize what people at the lower end of the economy live with on a day-to-day basis.

The reporter began asking individuals why they weren't seemingly interested in this "major announcement" and the answers were brutally honest:

"Why bother? They'll just doubletalk about 'a need to do this and having to do that', add a lot of crap about it being for the good of the country's future, then cut all of the stuff that they said they woudn't cut."

THE FACTS ARE IN.

In six years a single person has enjoyed the luxury of a \$13 increase a month for little things like food, clothing, etc.; you know, things that never go up in price. At the same time, the shelter portion - that goes directly into a landlord's pocket - has gone from \$200 to \$275. It took $5\frac{1}{2}$ years before the first increase happened (the \$13) but inflation is low if it's below 5% a year.

And note the NOTE: these rates are the highest if you are unemployable, but things like utilities and a phone are over and above the rents charged by 95% of all landlords. A lot ask at least \$10 more than the highest shelter portion so people have to eat less if they want a roof over their heads. If you are classified as "employable" (and remember that Clod Richmond made thousands fit in this category at the stroke of a pen) then you get less.

It's not a case of running on at everything. Poverty is kept going because it means a lot of jobs; it's good for business. It also stops a lot of people from becoming socially active because they have to survive; that takes more energy than a lot have. When Richmond cut rates by \$7 rather than raise the rates of those under 26 to be equal to those over 26 he showed the attitude of the "haves" to the "have-nots" - I'VE GOT MINE; WHAT'S MINE IS MINE AND WHAT'S YOURS IS ALSO MINE." Anger can have interesting consequences; morally decrepit people always do the wrong thing. Look at the budget, the welfare rates and the effect of Free Trade on us... how much rent do you pay?

With March 8, International Women's Day, fast approaching I thought your readers might be interested in taking a quick look at how women fare in Canadian politics and especially in serving in cabinet, where the real decision-makers of govt. exist. As of today there are 266 cabinet ministers serving in Canada among the federal, provincial and the two territorial governments. Of these 266 people, a mere 37 are women. And of those 37 female cabinet ministers 17. almost half, serve in health care, social service, tourism or culture portfolios - positions that many people would term as being more "female" oriented.

There has never been a female premier. There have only been two female opposition leaders - Leonne Bagnall (PC-PEI) and Sharon Carstairs (LIB-Man.). There have only been three female attorney generals or justice ministers - Kim Campbell (PC-Can.), Margaret Joe (NDP-Yuk.) and Lynn Verge (PC-Nfld.). There has been only one female finance minister - Bette Stephenson (PC-Ont.). There is, at present, only one female economic development minister - Lise Bacon (LIB-PQ).

Nationally only Kim Campbell (Justice) and Barbara McDougall (Employment and Immigration) are the ministers of a full cabinet portfolio. The other four female cabinet ministers serve as junior ministers, reporting through another cabinet minister. In the entire history(herstory) of Canada it was not until



APOLOGY

Stanley and Henrietta BEEGER, as owners, and John KLOSTER, as Manager, of a laundromat at 568A Powell Street, do hereby apologise to Miriam WILSON, a native person who lived in the downtown eastside.

The apology is the result of an incident which occurred on June 28, 1989, in the laundromat whereby John Kloster discriminated against Miriam because she is a native person, by refusing her access to the laundromat.

Both the owners and John sincerely apologise to Miriam for John's actions. They recognize that it is against the law to discriminate in the provisions of services available to the public and will ensure that such discrimination doesn't occur in the laundromat in the future.



The Status of Abortion in Canadian Law

1803:

An Act was passed in Britain that made abortion illegal, except if the pregnancy threatened the life of a woman. Canadian law was based on British law.

1929:

Canadian women are legally declared "persons"

1966:

British law amended; abortion legal.

pre-1969:

- The fetus was considered "protected" after it became "animated," at "quickening" (usually around 20 weeks). Disagreement: at what point did it become criminal to abort fetus?
- The Canadian Medical Association, together with the Canadian Bar Association, lobbied Parliament for changes to the abortion law. Doctors were increasingly concerned that they could be held legally responsible for performing an abortion.



1969:

- Section 251 of the Criminal Code passed by Parliament. It became a crime for a woman to have an abortion, and for any person to perform an abortion, EXCEPT: abortion was NOT a crime if performed by a qualified medical practitioner in an approved hospital, after the majority of members of a therapeutic abortion committee had certified that the continuation of the pregnancy "would or would be likely to endanger her health."
- During the vote in Parliament, more MP's were absent than voted yes/no.
- Dr. Henry Morgentaler starts performing abortions in a private clinic in Montreal. In 1970, the clinic was raided and arrests were made.

1973:

- Roe vs. Wade U.S Supreme Court legalized abortion (at least in the first trimester) throughout the U.S. All states must provide equal access to abortion.
- Morgentaler's Montreal clinic was raided by police; he was charged, acquitted by jury trial. That acquittal was overturned by Quebec Court of Appeal. Morgentaler appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada.

- Morgentaler's appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada asks if Quebec's Court of Appeal can overturn the acquittal by jury trial. Morgentaler's defence was that Section 251, from 1969 amendment to the Criminal Code, was invalid: he felt that the 1960 Canadian Bill of Rights took precedence over the Criminal Code. Justice Laskin of the Supreme Court noted his concern that the Bill of Rights was not constitutionally entrenched in the Canadian justice system, therefore there was no reason it should take precedence over the Criminal Code
- · Quebec decision upheld by Supreme Court of Canada. Morgentaler went to jail.

pöst 1975:

Canadian feminists start to lobby in favour of "bringing the Charter home." The theory is that if the Charter is firmly entrenched as Canadian constitutional law, then Justice Laskin's concern is met and Morgentaler cannot be sent to jail.

Morgentaler was tried two more times; acquitted both times.

1982:

- Charter of Rights and Freedoms comes home to Canada. From Section 15: Every individual is equal before and under the law... From Section 7: Everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of the person, and the right not to be deprived thereof except in accordance with the principles of fundamental justice.
- 66,319 therapeutic abortions performed in Canadian hospitals.

1983:

In response to the 1982 Charter of Rights and Freedoms, Dr. Henry Morgentaler, in defiance of the "abortion law," opened a free-standing abortion clinic in Toronto. He was charged with performing illegal abortions. He was acquitted by an Ontario jury in 1984. This was appealed by Ontario Court of Appeal, and Morgentaler's acquittal was overturned. Morgentaler appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada in 1986, arguing that the 1969 law violated clauses in the Charter of Rights and Freedoms:

63,508 therapeutic abortions performed in Canadian hospitals.

63,662 therapeutic abortions performed in Canadian hospitals.

Supreme Court of Canada, in a 5-2 decision, strikes down Section 251, Canada's abortion law, finding it in violation of the Charter's guarantee of life, liberty and the security of the person, in response to the Morgentaler case. Abortion is decriminalized in Canada.

Očf. 1988:

A national Gallup poll showed that 71.2% of adult Canadians are pro-choice.

1989:

- U.S. Supreme Court rules that individual states can limit access to abortion. This is contrary
 to the Roe vs. Wade decision which resulted in equal access to abortion everywhere in the U.S.
- State of Pennsylvania responds in October by placing strict limitations on abortion: a married woman must secure her husband's approval before an abortion can take place.
- Nov. 3, 1989: A bill is introduced to Canadian House of Commons which, if passed, would prohibit abortions except when a woman's physical, mental, or psychological health is threatened. The decision (of imposed threat of the pregnancy) is to be made by the woman's doctor. The proposed legislation would be an amendment to the Criminal Code.
- Nov. 16, 1989: The Supreme Court hands down their decision on the Chantal Daigle case. Daigle's ex-boyfriend sought an injunction that would prohibit Daigle from having an abortion. The Supreme Court decided that 1) a father has no rights until the fetus is completely born alive, and 2) the fetus has no rights until it is completely born alive.

These plasticene people no will of their own fighting ghosts of the past no new enemies shown all you need do is follow your fates all laid out go through history's pages and read all about your destiny.



In Memorium: JOSEPH PAUL BONNELL

Joseph Paul Bonnell from Nanoose Bay, B.C., passed away recently. Joseph was a thin, Native elder with a consistent sense of humour.

We knew him most because he was at the 1984 Crab Camp-in, an occupation of "federal lands" down at the foot of Columbia Street.

Although we were never organized to do a proper camp-in with supplies Joseph Paul tried to cook enough food so that some of the 60 tenters could eat. Probably the few pieces of bannock that he cooked was all some of the campers ate during some of those hard days.

Because of the spirit and support of people like Joseph, the Camp-In successfully lasted 75 days and was a major factor in there now being a 7 acre waterfront park in the downtown eastside.

Joseph understood issues like Native land claims and the Nanoose Bay peace camp which he supported.


He lived a tough life in poverty, but nobody could long wipe a smile off of his face.

He will be missed by many, especially his friends Bert Thomas, Donnie and Paul Denomie.

His body was sent back to Nova Scotia for the funeral. We should find some was of remembering the support Joseph Paul gave the underdog.

If it meets support, there is a suggestion to name the mini-park at Alexander and Main, "Joseph Paul Bonnell Park". This mini-park is a part of Crab waterfront park and is a part of what Joseph helped earn for our lowincome community.



I have attended two public meetings about the proposed garbage plant. Although I was opposed when I first heard the idea, I am now angry and adamantly opposed to the building of a commercial garbage plant in Vancouver for the follow-

ing reasons:1. There is a need in this society and in the world to tighten and sophisticate our recycling efforts.

2. Commercial garbage enterprise in North America has little or no interest in the environment..just as drug entrepreneurs have no interest in the damage that the drugs do to

the human environment.

3. Such a plant would degrade the surrounding land, parks, and residences. The continuum of trucks bringing garbage for sorting, and trucks taking away about 85% of what was brought to Burns Bog or Cache Creek would lead to increased noise and pollution, particularly when the Expo site and Marathon's Coal Harbour add their thousands of resi-

dences and accompanying businesses.
4. The area is described as 'industrial' but is encompassed by ap-

artments (Northern Way) and single family dwellings (Strathcona, Mount Pleasant, Grandview-Woodlands) and proposals for conversion of much of the area to more residential/commercial development. An example is the proposed multi-million dollar Bosa development at Terminal and Main, a mere four blocks away.

I understand that the Engineering
Department recommended against this
garbage disposal plan, but that the
Council decided to proceed to the
next stage. I would like to see (and
I'm sure that the general public
would like to see) a statement from
the Engineering Department stating
their reasons for recommending against
proceeding with the plan.

I should also like to comment on the organization of the Public Meeting held at Strathcona School on Feb. 7. About 20% of the audience was Chinese and did not speak English. No interpreter was provided. Fortunately a bilingual woman was there and able to translate.

Is the Council seriously interested in the views of the citizens? Or are we seeing a public relations job of soliciting input when a decision has already been made?

On February 7th the second meeting on Mayor Campbell's "Resource Recovery Plant" was held at Strathcona Community Centre. The engineers on the stage were under orders to go through the rest of the speaker's list, with over 25 names of people who didn't get to state their views at the first meeting held at Britannia two weeks previous.

The NPA majority on Council had tried to force this retarded scheme through by simply refusing to open it up to public hearings. Surveys done by different public interest groups found that the large majority of citizens asked for their opinion didn't know anything about it. What "it" is is a way to let all business and hotel/apartment owners north of 16th Avenue in Vancouver off the hook as far as being responsible for their garbage is concerned. Rather than setting up ways and means to educate people on how to recycle, how to separate reusable materials at the source, the NPA majority saw the best way to make someone a big They want to privatize the entire waste management system, pay a private company to skim anything they can sell from the mountains of refuse, pay them to haul it to and from the plant (proposed for Strathcona less than 1000 feet from food wholesalers (say hello to thousands of RATS)), pay them to dig out what they want, then pay them to haul at least 85% of the remaining smelly

To the point: at that meeting a 2nd meeting was demanded in Strath-cona at a time when the seniors of the community could come. Also demanded was a public hearing in the West End; residents there are angry that they are being completely denied

mess to a landfill. Brilliant!!!

a comprehensive community recycling program so a few big corporations can get bigger. The real point is simply that the City has failed to hold either of these meetings.

Maybe having to spew the NPA's brand of logic anywhere except at Council meetings (where they are assured of the last word) must scare them shitless. Criticism from the peasants (that's us) must be really galling when you think you're untouchable like Campbell does.

The engineers'reports on the 2 meetings held (public input) are going to Council. Call the City Clerk to appear on Thursday, March 8. 873-7276! A deluge of speakers will be GREAT!!!

DERA HAS BEEN SERVING THE DOWNTOWN EASTSIDE FOR 15 YEARS

Not too many of you reading this have cars. Issues that affect us are the destruction of affordable housing, the obscenity of corporations getting tax breaks while the minimum wage, U.I. and welfare keep thousands of people in poverty... Cars are somebody else's problem.

In the last two issues, there have been articles from a group based in Vernon called the Association for Vehicle Movement and Safety. They've managed to take the lid off a slimy can of worms and, in a response to their persistent questions, the minister responsible for a new "safety" program has exposed another part of the corporate agenda.

Background information is fairly simple: the socred government has made almost anything from ripped seat covers to dirty floors a legal reason for police to take cars off the road while police in different regions of the province are saying that they won't enforce things that 'enough people' don't like. What it means is that anyone with a car or truck over a couple of years old will have to either pay huge repair bills or buy a new(er) vehicle. This whole piece of legislation is great news for car dealers, businesspeople in *to repair and parts and the police who can increase their revenue with inspection fees, fines, etc. When Vanderzalm tried to mess with the office of the Attorney General, Bud Smith resigned, stating that it was a "matter of honour." Vanderzalm then split the ministry in two and put the department of motor vehicle and the police in the same department. Fines, fees and licences now benefit the legal branch with a huge increase in revenue brought about by this stupid program. Following is a press release from the Associa tion for Vehicle Movement 3 Safety:

"The Solicitor General doesn't know what he's talking about in his explanation of the new Private Vehicle Inspection Program," said Stuart Meade, spokesman for the Association for Vehicle Movement Safety.

Meade's comments were in reaction

to a recent response from the Solicitor General, Russ Fraser. In his letter Fraser claimed that no useful purpose would be served by performing an assessment of the costs and benefits of this program, and even admitted he didn't know how many people

"It only requires a pocket calculator to figure out that in inspection fees alone, \$51 million will be extracted from the owners of 1.7 million vehicles licensed in B.C. I guess Mr. Fraser isn't curious as to how much this program is going to burden the public," Meade reflected.

The Solicitor General attempted

"He even got this wrong!" said Meade. "Mr. Fraser quoted me the figure of 2.44 percent of all accidents had 'vehicle condition as a contributing factor.' In fact. 1.33 percent is the real figure. Mr. Fraser's calculation ignores the 46,762 accidents which have not been included in the compilation of "Major Contributing Factors in 1988 Accidents." (1988 Motor Vehicle Branch Traffic Accident Statistics Manual, pg 1.1 &3.1) Meade observed that, "If he is ans= wering me with all the facts he has at hand, then he has managed to implement

"What we have is a program that will be burdening the vehicle owners of this province with horrendous costs, without any statistical justification, while ignoring other very real hazards of vehicle

In the last issue a postcard was reproduced. It was addressed to then-Minister of Justice Doug Lewis, stating:


Dear Mr. Lewis,
